Chapel anniversary celebrated

Episcopal celebrated the 30th anniversary of the consecration of the A.C. Lewis Memorial Chapel of the Good Shepherd with a Holy Eucharist and reception on Feb. 4.

Episcopal's Chapel was originally consecrated on Feb. 1, 1974, by the Rt. Rev. Iveson B. Noland, who was the diocesan bishop, during the Convention of the Diocese of Louisiana.

The Rev. Mark Holland, rector of St. James Episcopal Church, celebrated the anniversary Eucharist. The Rev. A. Dean Calcote, who was Episcopal's chaplain when the Chapel was originally consecrated, gave the sermon.

Also participating in the service were the Rev. Ralph Howe, rector of Trinity Episcopal Church, Dr. John Houghton, Episcopal's chaplain, the Rev. Deacon Charles DeGravelles, Episcopal's associate chaplain, the Rev. Brian Burgess, associate priest and chaplain of the day school at St. Luke's Episcopal Church, the Rev. Deacon Tommy Dillon, vicar at St. Augustine's Church, and the Rev. A. J. Heine,

College counselor named La. delegate to SACAC

Episcopal's college counselor, Juliet Johnson, has been honored with her selection as the Louisiana delegate for the Southern Association for College Admission Counseling, a regional affiliate of the National Association for College Admission Counseling.

The organization sets standards for high schools and colleges for the college admissions process.

Additionally, Ms. Johnson is beginning a two-year term on Georgia Tech's high school advisory board and is mid-way through a two-year term on the University of Georgia's advisory board. Those boards, which meet twice a year, allow high school college counselors to gain access to information about trends in college admissions.

Ms. Johnson has also been gathering information about college admissions offices through visits to colleges.

During her three years at Episcopal, Ms. Johnson has visited numerous college admissions offices in all parts of the country, including the University of Pennsylvania, the Naval Academy, Stanford, Cal Tech, UC-Berkeley, Davidson, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the University of Miami, among others.

In addition to developing relationships with college admissions counselors, Ms. Johnson is helping students with the college admissions process through a new partnership with the Princeton Review to help students improve their standardized test scores. The Princeton Review will offer nine courses for ACT, SAT and PSAT test preparation on campus this summer at a reduced cost for Episcopal students. The Princeton Review will also follow up with a course one week before the actual test date.

The list of college acceptances for the class of 2004 is impressive.

Students have been accepted to a wide range of excellent colleges and universities nationally, including Duke, University of Pennsylvania, Stanford, Columbia, the Naval Academy, University of Southern California, Washington University, Johns Hopkins, Wellesley, Smith, New York University, University of Virginia, University of Miami, William and Mary, University of Texas, Emory, Boston University, University of Georgia, Georgia Tech, Tulane and LSU Honors College.

Three seniors named candidates in Presidential Scholar program

Stephanie Leu, Jon Jon Lo and Adam Wyatt, graduating seniors at Episcopal, have been named candidates in the 2004 Presidential Scholars Program. Approximately 2,600 candidates were selected from the nearly 2.8 million students expected to graduate from U.S. high schools this year.

Inclusion in the Presidential Scholars Program is one of the highest honors bestowed upon graduating high school seniors. Scholars are selected on the basis of superior academic and artistic achievements, leadership qualities, strong character and involvement in community and school activities.

The 2,600 candidates were selected based on their exceptional performance on either the College Board SAT or the ACT Assessment. Further consideration is based on students' essays, self-assessments, descriptions of activities, school recommendations and school transcripts.

A panel of educators will review these submissions and select 500

semifinalists.

The Commission on Presidential Scholars, a group of 32 citizens appointed by the president, will make final selection of the scholars.

The commission will select one boy and one girl from each state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and U.S. students living abroad; 15 students-at-large; and up to 20 students from the creative and performing arts. The U.S. Department of Education will announce the scholars this month.

Scholars will be invited to Washington for several days in June to receive the Presidential Scholars medallion at a recognition ceremony and to participate in events and activities with their elected representatives, educators and other leading individuals in public life.

Trinity Episcopal rector named senior chaplain at Episcopal

The Very Rev. Ralph F. Howe Jr., rector of Trinity Episcopal Church, will join Episcopal on July 1 as the full-time senior chaplain.

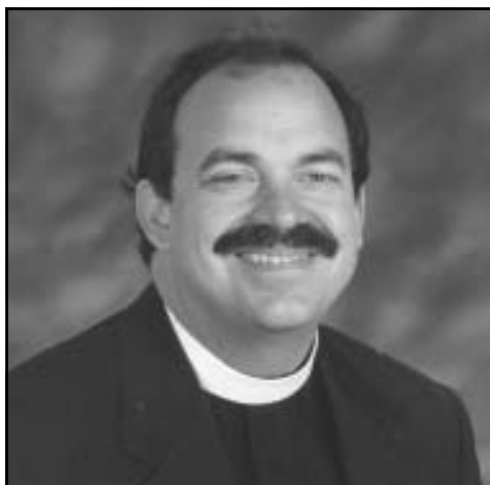
As senior chaplain, Father Howe will serve as a key member of Episcopal's administrative leadership team.

The Right Rev. Charles E. Jenkins, bishop of the Diocese of Louisiana, said, "I am very pleased that the Very Rev. Ralph Howe has been called to be the senior chaplain at Episcopal. The students, faculty and staff at Episcopal are very fortunate that Father Howe is willing to leave a successful and thriving parish ministry to become a part of the Episcopal School family. He is one of the best priests in the Diocese of Louisiana – bright, articulate, faithful, and, perhaps most important, he has a wonderful sense of humor. The faithfulness and love that he will bring to Episcopal are gifts we have prayed for. Father Howe's presence will help to ensure a bright future for this significant institution in Baton Rouge and the Diocese of Louisiana."

Episcopal's interim headmaster, Henry P. "Peter" Briggs, said he considers this to be the most important appointment he will make at Episcopal. "We have no more important responsibility than to nurture the spiritual growth of our students," he said in a letter to members of the Episcopal community announcing the appointment.

Father Howe is a native of Baton Rouge. He and his wife, Suzette, have four children.

After graduating from Tara High School, Father Howe enrolled at the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn., and graduated in 1978 with a degree in psychology. He spent two years as a physical therapy assistant at the

Baton Rouge General Hospital, before enrolling at the General Theological Seminary in New York City, where he earned his master's degree in divinity in 1983. He next spent one year as a deacon at Trinity Church, New Orleans, two years as an assistant at St. James Church, Alexandria, and five years as the rector of Trinity Church, Crowley. He returned to Baton Rouge in 1991 to Trinity Church and became Trinity's rector in 1992.

Father Howe said, "I am overjoyed at the prospect of working at Episcopal. I remember watching the first building there being constructed. After having a niece and a nephew graduate from Episcopal, and after seeing the quality of education that my own children have received, I have felt a continued appreciation of the School. I consider my move there to be the answer to a call that has been growing within me."

NJROTC cadets earn top rating in inspection

Episcopal's NJROTC cadets earned a Bravo Zulu ribbon, the highest award possible, during their annual inspection.

The inspection was completed on Feb. 11 by Cmdr. Terry Rauch.

Episcopal's NJROTC cadets also placed third out of 20 schools in the Armed Drill Team competition and fifth in personnel inspection at a drill meet in Slidell on March 21.

Additionally, freshman Robert Burgess finished second out of more than 300 cadets in the Individual Precision Drill.

Search Committee Update

The first step in our search effort has been to develop a profile of the qualities desired in our next Head of School and to identify the new Head's key opportunities and challenges. The March meeting of the Board of Trustees was a working session focused exclusively on this. The lengthy process involved review, discussion and evaluation of the input gathered by Dr. Margaret Bonz when she visited students, parents, faculty, alumni and other important Episcopal constituencies in March. That input included over 140 responses to the survey and numerous personal interviews. There was strong consensus by all constituencies on the key qualities sought in a new Head of School. Based on this work, Dr. Bonz then drafted a six page brochure that describes Episcopal, discusses the qualities we are seeking, describes the opportunities and challenges ahead, and includes a calendar of key events over the next six months. That profile is now available to you on the Episcopal website at www.ehsbr.org. Please take time to read it - it is a great story and one that all of us should be proud of!

The search process has begun - Dr. Bonz is already talking with candidates and distributing the profile. She will continue this process throughout most of the summer until all applications are due on July 23, 2004. If you would like to submit a candidate's name or make a potential candidate aware of this opportunity, please contact Dr. Bonz directly; she will follow up on every recommendation she receives.

Father Calcote said former students have told him that their time in Chapel is what they miss the most about school. “At the heart of our life together is this building, which we call the house of God,” he said. “This is a place where we can focus on God without distraction.”

During the service, Father Holland blessed vestments and a chalice donated to the Chapel by Episcopal’s Parents’ Guild. He also installed junior Butler Bourgeois as head server for the school and junior Andrew Lutz as head sacristan.

The boys golf team won its second straight state championship, while the girls golf team finished second in state.

The boys indoor track team also won the state championship. The girls finished fourth at the state indoor track meet. Karen Pace won an individual state championship in pole vault, while Sean Swanner won the 3,200, and the boys 3,200-meter relay team also finished first.

In outdoor track, the boys won the district and regional championship. The girls won the district championship and finished second at regionals. Both teams were still competing at press time.

The girls soccer team advanced to the quarterfinal round of the state playoffs, while the boys soccer team advanced to the bi-district round of the playoffs after finishing second in district play. William Davidson and

Alumna writes book on hiking trails in Louisiana

Episcopal alumna Janina Baxley Rogers, '88, combined her loves of writing and hiking with the book "50 Hikes in Louisiana," which was published by The Countryman Press, a division of W.W. Norton and Company.

Mrs. Rogers spent five months hiking Louisiana trails – bringing along a measuring wheel, GPS, hand-held recorder and camera – while compiling information for the book, which she completed last year. She also interviewed park rangers and state park employees.
